In Grade 12, Toby Buzzai Wilson enjoyed TCE subjects such as biology, physics and psychology that really expanded his thinking. "Quantum Physics threw a spanner into the works of everything we thought we knew, which was interesting,

but on the brink of scary," Toby recalls. "I could also have spent many more hours in the philosophy classroom with Dr Clements and the rest of the class, talking over ideas."

Support from his teachers was a hallmark of Toby's whole experience at Grammar. He was a key part of bringing the School's mountain bike track to fruition in 2018, with the encouragement and guidance of his teachers. "It was a good opportunity to reach outside the classic definition of 'school'," he says. "The project gave me and my teammates a sense of what it takes to bring anything new into the world. It's more than just having the initial idea, which can seem small and simple. After learning the many nuances of project planning and proposals, I really appreciated the enormous scope of the project and what it meant to complete such a feat."

After an intense final year of study, Toby decided to take a break before going to university. His interest in mountain biking and love of the outdoors took him to the Tasmanian east coast, where he has spent time surfing, hiking and biking in between his work as a tour guide at Derby. He believes that his education at Grammar prepared him well for transitioning into this phase of adult life. "The academic content I learned at Grammar combined with social skills built up through friendships, sports and class activities definitely helped me enter the real world with confidence."

However, the biggest shift in his thinking since finishing school has been a greater appreciation for giving back to the community. "I didn't get super involved in fundraising during Grade 12 as I was trying to keep all my subjects on my plate," he says. "Coming from such a supportive environment where everyone is behind you to achieve your goals, it can be easy to maintain that self-focus and forget that there are other important things to contribute to. Although I didn't fully embrace the fundraising and volunteering during Grade 12, luckily I made up for it in my gap year."

He encourages future students to try and balance both study and the community service aspect of Grade 12, as the benefits are rich. "With an increased awareness and understanding of others, I feel more confident in navigating my revised understanding of the 'real world'. This is something that I feel no amount of academic learning could have taught me. For those of you planning on heading straight into uni after School, I strongly suggest throwing yourself into Grade 12's fundraising and volunteering opportunities while you have the chance. They will give you a glimpse of the real world that even many jobs can't."
